### Revenue

Revenue comprises of government grants, donations and fundraising activities.

Revenue is measuerd by reference to the fair value of consideration received or receivable by the Company for services/goods supplied.

### **Government grants**

A number of the Company's programs are supported by grants received from the fedreal, state and local governments. If conditions are attached to a grant which must be satisfied before the Company is eligible to receive the contribution, recognition of the grant as revenue is deferred until those conditions are satisfied. When a grant is received on the condition that specified services are delivered to the grantor, this is considered a reciprocal transaction. Revenue is recognised as services are performed and at year end a liability is recognised until the sevice is delivered.

#### Donations

Donations collected, including cash and goods are recognised as revenue when the company gains control, economic benefits are probable and the amount of the donation can be measured reliably. Interest income is recognised on a cash basis.
